Jane M. White, 73, 2306 Cleveland St., Eau Claire, passed away unexpectedly at home.



Jane was born on July 31, 1920 in Madison, Wis. to Monroe B. and Gertrude (Kremers) Milliren. The family moved to Eau Claire early in 1932 when Mr. Milliren began a long career as teacher, coach and administrator at Eau Claire State Teachers College. Jane graduated from Eau Claire Senior High School in 1937 and from Eau Claire state Teachers College in 1941 as an honors student and member of Kappa Delta Pi. She taught at Lady Smith and Watertown high schools.

She was married to Russell L. White on December 31, 1943 in St. Joseph, Missouri. They returned to Eau Claire to live after his discharge from the U.S. Air Force. Jane was a librarian at the Eau Claire Public Library University. of Wis - Eau Claire, E.M. Hale and Company - library book publishers, and Chippewa Valley Technical College. She was a lifelong active member of Lake Street United Methodist Church and was a member of P.E.O. Sisterhood Chapter AF since 1947, and their past president. She was also a volunteer at the Chippewa Valley Museum, as well as a member of the Chippewa Valley Genealogical Research Society, Alpha Xi Delta and the Daughters of the American Revolution.



Jane is survived by one daughter, Margaret (Wayne) Grudem, Libertyville, Ill., and one son Dan (Debbie) White of Winona, MN., five grandsons, Elliot, Oliver and Alexander Grudem, John and James White, several nieces and nephews and many, many friends. She was preceded in death by her husband, her parents, and a sister Beth Campbell.

Services will be held on Monday at 11 A.M. at Lake Street United Methodist Church with Rev. Kent Ingram and Rev. Janet Ellinger officiating. Burial will be in Lake View Cemetery.
